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

Friday, August 13, 2010 - Conference Sessions

0900-1000 Keynote Session: Battlefield and Lessons Learned - John Groves Salon ABCD

An overview of the preparation, training, and deployment, from a young staff with an average of four months emergency care experience to one of the busiest Trauma centers in the world, and achieving a 94 percent survival rate from combat trauma injuries.

Miracle of Life - Chris Ebright

Luckily, most pre-hospital deliveries involve a catch, suctioning, and warming the newborn. Sometimes though, Murphy's Law gets in the way - resulting in a complicated birth process. Topics including placenta previa, abruptio placenta, shoulder dystocia, CPD, and breech birth are explained in this not-always-necessary-but-essential-to-know presentation.

Biology of Learning: Teaching with the Brain in Mind - Kathleen Friesen Salon ABC

A survey of information from recent and progressive education and neuroscience literature. Discover the implications for learning *and* leading in the classroom through this review of interpersonal neuroscience. If you are an educator or trainer responsible for helping students to acquire knowledge, this program is for you.

EM²S - Topic 1: Annoy the Curmudgeon? Chy Miller Wichita Ballroom

In the spirit of the TED lecture, this EM²S presentation will focus on the common question "How do I get those who don't want to be in training interested in training?" Join Chy as he takes an unusual and humorous look at how the "first follower" is essential in dealing with those "training curmudgeons."

EM²S - Topic 2: Lightning Strikes — Bill Auchterlonie Wichita Ballroom

This session focuses on the response to and treatment of lightning strikes. These occurrences are not uncommon (lightning kills more people per year in Kansas than any other weather phenomenon) and carry a great deal of misunderstanding on the part of rescuers. 1130-1300 Kansas Trauma Update - Rosanne Rutkowski & Jeanette Shipley Arkansas Room

The Kansas Advisory Committee on Trauma works to create trauma processes and guidelines to improve our response at all levels to trauma patients. This lunch time session provides an update to the current happenings within Kansas Trauma and is delivered by Rosanne Rutkowski and Jeanette Shipley with the Kansas Trauma program.

SIDS – Kansas SIDS Network – Christy Schunn Salon D

The Sudden Infant Death Investigation Training developed by the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, Georgia is a systematic training program for the Professional Infant Death Investigation Specialist and was developed as a guide to recommended practices to assist the investigation of infant deaths and the reporting of scene data to the pathologist for accurate diagnosis.

Personal Preparedness: The YO-YO Principle and You Elizabeth Ablah Salon ABC

In response to a general deficiency highlighted by recent disasters, personal and family emergency preparedness planning has become increasingly necessary. As part of this presentation, Dr. Ablah will discuss the benefits of developing a plan as well as identify the elements vital to any basic preparedness plan.

EM²S - Topic 3: The Science of CPR - Jon Friesen Wichita Ballroom

In late 2010, the AHA will release their new guidelines for CPR. But have we implemented the 2005 guidelines? Many of us answer yes, yet in reality we've missed some really important things that make the difference between living and dying from sudden cardiac arrest. Join Jon Friesen for a fast paced look at the keys to success in resuscitation and prepare to be surprised at what really makes a difference. This quick look at CPR reveals some amazing insights into our blind spots for resuscitation and gives no-nonsense solutions to improve our care of cardiac arrest.



EM²S - Topic 4: Therapeutic Hypothermia - Dalene Deck Wichita Ballroom

Successful resuscitation from sudden cardiac arrest is only the first step in bringing someone back to a functional life. Preventing complications must begin immediately following resuscitation and EMS has a significant role in reducing life altering complications. In this session, Dalene Deck overviews therapeutic hypothermia and gives concrete suggestions for how to bring this therapy to your service.

1430-1530 General Session: Resiliency - John Groves Salon ABCD

Working in the pre-hospital environment and facing the stressors we face requires providers to develop attitudes and mechanisms by which they can continue to function in healthy ways. This session uses lessons learned in the battlefield that easily translate to our profession and give us ideas for becoming resilient in our roles as EMS providers.

1545-1645 General Session: When the Bough Breaks - Chris Ebright Salon ABCD

We all have heard at one time or another "never, ever shake a baby". Unfortunately, when it happens, EMS providers are the first to encounter what is usually a bad situation. Pathophysiology, signs and other issues relating to this terrible event are explained in this presentation that is not for the faint of heart.

Bill brings a wealth of experience along with completion of a fellowship with Seattle/King County regarding resuscitation.

First Responders, Beware – Electrical Emergencies - Part 1 - Tim Boswell, Pat Bush, Scott Hildebrandt Salon ABC

Every year in the U.S. Emergency Responders are severely injured, or killed as a result of "First Responding" to an accident involving "Electrical Hazards". Police, firefighters, and EMS are generally the first to arrive on the scene of an emergency and face the greatest risks of exposure to electrical hazards. Westar Energy wants to influence First Responder organizations to take steps to adopt electrical safety education and accident prevention practices. These at-risk groups have a constant work-related exposure to risks related to electricity. Demonstrations in this program will amaze the participant as they see how common items thought to be insulators to electricity can severely injure the "First Responder".

EM²S - Topic 5: The Forgotten Epidemic - Chris Ebright Wichita Ballroom

Elder patients present in many ways. It is important to realize that their injuries and illnesses may be a circumstance of abuse and/or neglect. This presentation focuses on helping the EMS professional perform a thorough evaluation to allow for the best possible outcomes.

We have seen an explosion of technology devoted to high quality simulation. Unfortunately, most of these efforts have been directed toward entertainment rather than education. 


