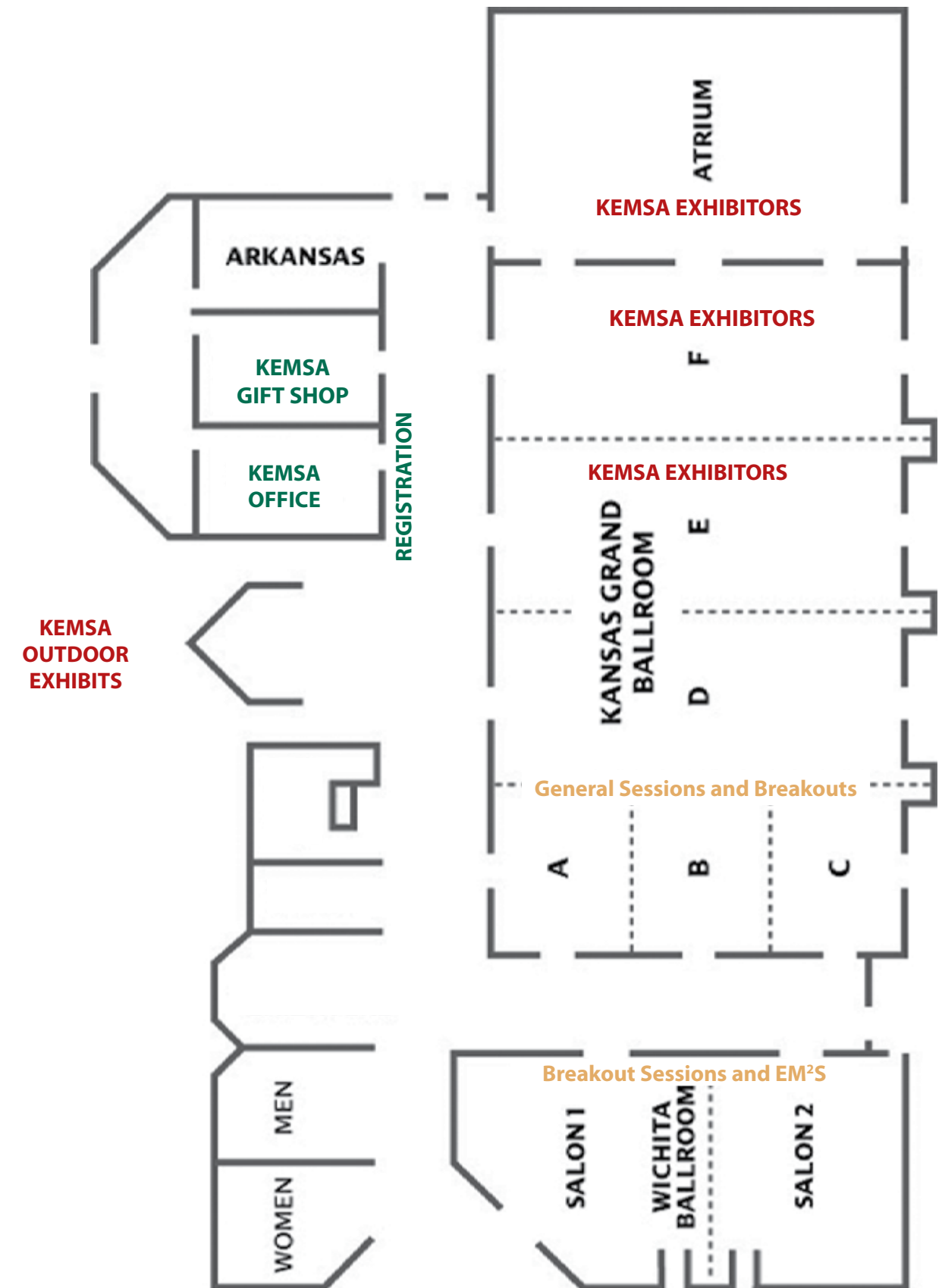

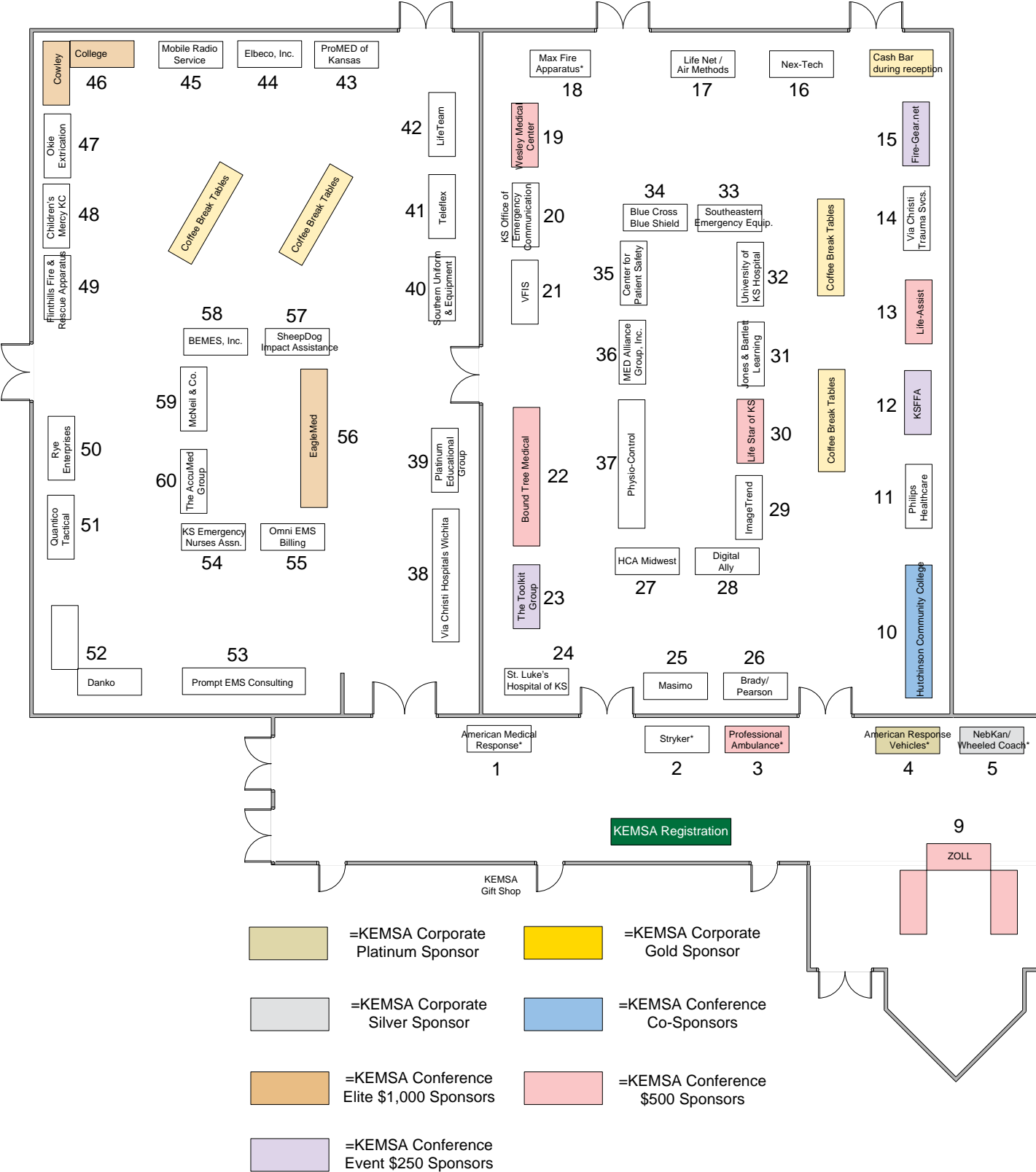

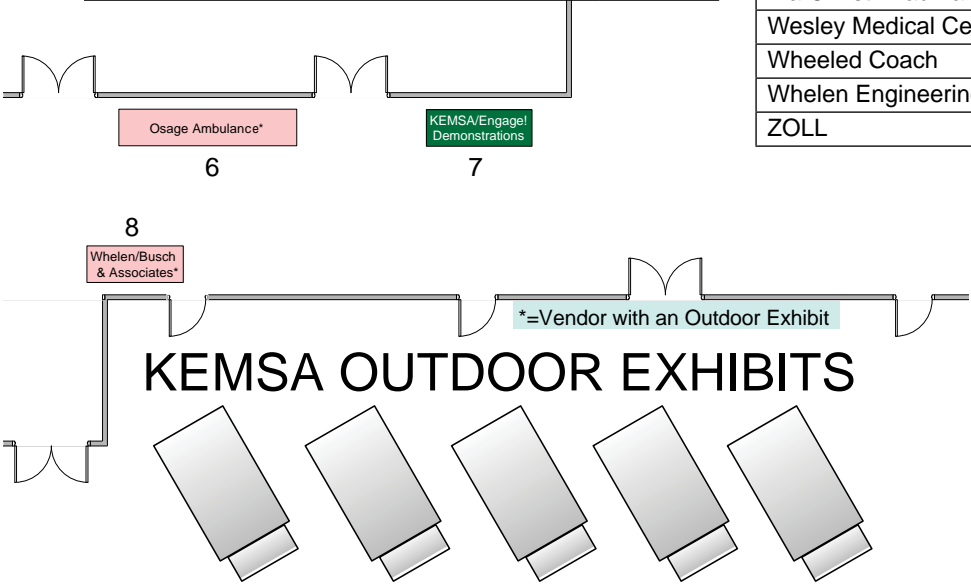

## 2014 KEMSA Conference



## Pre-Conference Sessions - Thursday, Aug. 14, 2014

There is an additional fee to attend these sessions.

### 0800-1700 Billing Seminar Corporate Hills Ballroom

*Speakers: Thom Ryan, Anthony Minge, Representatives from Insurance Companies*

One of the featured speakers for this session will be Thom Ryan with WPS Medicare. He will cover medical necessity, ABNs, Ground vs. Air Crew, SNF, Consolidated Billing, and other topics. The other featured speaker is Anthony Minge, MBA, EMS Consultant with Fitch & Associates. Anthony's session will answer EMS billing documentation questions about what is needed, why is it needed, who do you need to provide it to, and when. The remainder of the afternoon will allow representatives from BlueCross BlueShield of KS, EDI, Preferred Health Systems, United Healthcare Commercial, and United Healthcare Tricare to discuss updates from their companies.

### 0800-1700 Educator's Workshop Wichita Ballroom

This year's educator's workshop will be presented by Bill Young, Assistant Professor at Eastern Kentucky University. Topic 1: Slaying the National Certification Dragon: Preparation of your students to pass their certification or licensure examination begins with the first test or quiz. This presentation will enable the educator to develop better exams. During this presentation, the student will learn about the six levels of test item composition and why it is imperative to develop questions that challenge critical thinking and not just memorization of facts and figures.

Topic 2: Have You Flipped?: The idea of turning the classroom into a hands-on environment while using screencasting to provide the lecture isn't new...except to EMS. This class will provide the information needed to flip the EMS classroom to provide more psychomotor practice and better results on the certification examination. Students will actually go through the process of developing, recording, editing and reviewing a short presentation.

### 0800-1700 Practical, Fast, Effective Moulage Arkansas and Water Rescue Arkansas/Pool Area

*Presented by Hutchinson Community College*

**Moulage**: The first half of this hands-on workshop will focus on practical, fast, effective moulage. Attendees will learn the basics of moulage along with how to apply passive and active moulage techniques. Attendees will also learn about premade moulage items and how to make them yourself.

**Water Rescue**: The second half of this workshop will focus on water rescue. Through videos, presentations, and hands-on training in the hotel pool, participants will learn about safety issues at the scene of a water rescue, basic emergency care and transportation based on assessment findings for an acutely injured patient, and treatment options for patients following water rescue. This presentation will give you eight simple rules to follow for water rescue and give you a chance to practice them. *You will need to come dressed for getting in the water for this session.*

### 0800-1600 Administrator's Workshop Salon A-C

*Organized by KEMSA Administrator's Society*

This Administrator's Workshop will discuss relevant topics for EMS administrators, including: the Fair Labor Standard Act and how it relates to EMS; Tips, Tricks, and Other HR items for Service Directors; Understanding and Engaging Millennial Employees with a group discussion; and Ambulance Safety and Design.

The Fair Labor Standard Act (FLSA) will encompass the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, including but not limited to accurate record of hours worked, on call time, and training time. Next will be Tips, Tricks, and Other HR items for Service Directors. To maximize the resources of the talent in your business - you need an understanding of the strategic and tactical aspects of HR.

Dr. Allison McFarland will lead the discussion on Understanding and Engaging Millennial Employees. This seminar will provide specific steps managers can take to enhance their proficiency in leading, mentoring, retaining and managing Millennial employees. Following her presentation, there will be a discussion to identify best practices for the "new breed" of emergency personnel.

The day will end with Ronald Rolfsen talking about Ambulance Safety and Design. In Norway, there is a tradition to use smaller ambulances compared to USA. This presentation will discuss the process from idea to finished product and how to involve the users.

### 0800-1600 Street Medic Workshop Salon D

*Presented by Cowley College*

patients. This student-centered, hands-on session will focus on current treatment modalities for both adult and pediatric patients. Topics include advanced capnography

applications, hemorrhage control, the difficult airway, portable ventilators, EMS research evaluation methods, and psychiatric emergencies.

**General Session: 1430-1530 Leaving a Legacy - The EMT as a Mentor - Dan Limmer Salon A-D**

When you were new to EMS did someone "take you under their wing?" or "show you the ropes?" EMT training is largely classroom, which leaves students educated but unprepared for the street. EMT mentors help new EMTs gain experience, build confidence, and set the foundation for a life-long EMS experience. Help new EMTs avoid sink or swim situations that erode confidence and end careers. You know how to help your patients, now learn how to help your fellow EMTs.

**General Session: 1545-1645 Trauma for Two; No Waiting! - Bill Young Salon A-D**

During this session attendees will understand the pathophysiology associated with trauma and the late term pregnancy patient. Secondly the attendee will understand the modalities of treatment and care to be rendered toward the mother and infant involved in trauma.

## Regular Conference - Saturday, Aug. 16, 2014

**0700-0800 Medical Research Review 1 - Dr. Charles Foat**

**Wichita Ballroom**

This session will explore some emerging trends in the science of resuscitation and discuss how this research may redefine the EMS approach to cardiac arrest. We will discuss how these concepts can be applied by EMS to maximize neurologically intact survival for cardiac arrest victims.

**General Session: 0830-0930 The Bombing and Shooting in Norway 7.22.11 - Ronald Rolfsen Salon A-D**

On July 22, 2011 a car bomb exploded in Oslo next to a governmental building. Eight people were killed and more than 100 were injured. Two hours later, a perpetrator dressed in a police uniform arrived at Utøya Island where there was a summer camp for politically active youth. The perpetrator immediately started killing people. In the end, 69 were killed and 66 were wounded. This presentation will focus on the prehospital work and lesson learned.

**General Session: 0945-1045 Now I Lay Me Down to Sleep - Case Studies in Suicide - Dan Limmer Salon A-D**

Calls involving suicide or attempted suicide are challenging calls for any level of EMS provider. While the medical care of the patient is usually clear cut, the psychiatric emergency care is less concrete, leaving EMS providers feeling unsure of the right thing to do.

This presentation uses actual case studies to examine the physical and psychological aspects of suicide and attempted suicide. Risk factors, suicide plans, repeat suicide attempts, and the treatment for suicidal patients will be discussed. At the completion of this program, the participant will have a greater understanding of the mindset of the suicidal patient, which will ultimately lead to improved patient care.

**General Session: 1115-1215 Extreme Gunshot Wounds - Ken Bouvier Salon A-D**

This session is designed to help Prehospital Care Practitioners better understand and manage Extreme Gun Shot Wounds. Each year nearly 55,000 people are killed as a result of firearms. Medical reports indicate that nearly



500,000 people Dial 911 and use the Emergency Medical Services for Extreme Gun Shot Wounds each year. The high incidence of injury and death due to firearms is second only to motor vehicle accidents. This session will use Gun Violence data collected from U.S. Cities including the City of New Orleans “The Big Easy”! During this session we will discuss types of weapons used and explain the following topics: Types on Injuries; Mechanisms of Injury; Kinetic Energy; Shock from Blood Loss; and Basic and Advanced Life Support.

**1215-1315 Kansas Public Safety Broadband – What You Need to Know - Craig Divoll** **Wichita Ballroom**

In February 2012, Congress enacted legislation containing landmark provisions to create a much-needed nationwide interoperable broadband network that will help police, firefighters, emergency medical service professionals, and other public safety officials stay safe and do their jobs. Learn and provide feedback on the governing framework for the deployment and operation of this network, which is to be based on a single, national network architecture called the “First Responder Network Authority” (FirstNet). This will be great information for EMS agencies that rely on mobile communication and data integration.

**1315-1415 Breakout Sessions (3 options)**

**A. If Anybody on this Flight has any Medical Training . . . Medical Care at 30,000 Feet - Curtis Olson** **Salon D**

What happens when YOU are the healthcare professional on a commercial airline flight where there is a medical emergency? This presentation looks at the types and prevalence of medical incidents on airliners, and the resources that you can expect to have when you are taking care of patients at 30,000 feet.

**B. Making EKGs as Easy as ABC-123 - Justin Swank** **Salon A-C**

This lecture will cover basic EKG interpretation starting with the basics of EKG paper measurements, EKG electrical conduction descriptions, and understanding of the electrical conduction throughout the heart. We will cover 3 and 4 lead rhythm interpretation for all levels of providers and provide the BLS providers with a basic understanding of why they are applying the monitor and what the squiggly lines on the screen mean.

**C. EM’S 1: Diagnosis Isn’t a Dirty Word - Dan Limmer** **Wichita Ballroom**  
(25 minutes)

For years it seemed to be written in stone that EMTs don’t diagnose. Today’s EMT is armed with increasing knowledge and a bigger toolbox—making field or presumptive diagnosis necessary. This presentation describes the differential diagnostic process for the EMT. An effective history and physical examination is not a rote series of steps. For the thinking EMT, it is based on the differential diagnostic approach. This session will provide in-depth yet practical information on this vital thinking process.

**C. EM’S 2: Fall Prevention - Dr. Teresa Radebaugh** **Wichita Ballroom**  
(25 minutes)

Falls can be devastating for older adults and often result in significant morbidity and mortality. There has been little attention to intervention programs that are suitable for use in health care professional shortage areas or by emergency responders. The Falling Less in Kansas (Falling LinKS) Toolkit was developed to meet these unaddressed needs. Examples of programs and approaches for use of the Toolkit by EMS providers will be discussed.

**1430-1530 Breakout Sessions (3 options)**

**A. EMS Myth Busters: Evidence-Based Medicine - Curtis Olson** **Salon D**

Does recent research support or refute some of the traditional practices of EMS? This lecture looks at the latest tests and changes in CPR, bleeding control, splinting, care of shock, spinal immobilization, oxygen administration, and other longstanding standards in emergency care. Prepare to open your mind as we bust some prehospital myths.

**B. Lyophilized Plasma & Injury Acuity Alarm - Dr. Don Fishman** **Salon A-C**

This session will discuss Lyophilized Plasma and its use in trauma along with Injury Acuity Alarm, which is a new method to identify patients who require lifesaving intervention (LSI). Attendees will learn about the history of the use of plasma in resuscitation, different volumes of reconstitution of lyophilized plasmas, and the time factors and benefits of using lyophilized plasma. Then attendees will hear a discussion about injury acuity alarm. This new method will be discussed, so attendees will understand what the miniature wireless vital signs monitor (MWVSM) is and how it functions, what situations it would have the greatest impact, and comparing standard vital signs measurement vs. MWVSM for identifying patients requiring LSI.



**C. Oh, the Places Nobody Wants to Go: Updated Infection Control Regulations for the EMS Workforce - Jeff Robinson** **Wichita Ballroom**

New regulations for infection control have gone into effect that create both opportunity and obligation for EMS agencies and leaders. Attend this lecture for an overview of those regulations and what they mean for you, your department, and your patients.

**General Session: 1545-1645 Bats, Balls, and Trauma Calls - Ken Bouvier** **Salon A-D**

This session will help all attendees better understand sports

injuries that occur in neighborhood ballparks. During this session, we will take a look at some of the most common types of sports injuries to children and teenagers from Little League through High School. We will review how children are often injured while riding bicycles, skateboarding and playing baseball, football, and soccer. We will discuss the treatment for sprains, strains, and injuries caused by repetitive sports. We will also discuss sports related trauma calls such as fractures, head injuries, and blunt trauma. We will discuss both BLS and ALS treatment for specific sports injuries and will end the session by immobilizing a baseball player with a common baseball injury.

**Regular Conference - Sunday, Aug. 17, 2014**

**0700-0800 Medical Research Review 2 - Dr. Charles Foat** **Wichita Ballroom**

This session will explore some recent studies on shock and perfusion emerging from the military research. The US Military predicts that a new approach can decrease mortality by 25% with a few basic low cost interventions. We will discuss how this research thread may reshape the civilian EMS approach to identifying and managing shock in our patients.

**0900-1000 Caring for the Morbidly Obese - Ken Bouvier** **Salon A-D**

This session will help First Responders, EMTs, Paramedics, Nurses, and Physicians have a better understanding of how morbidly obese patients are injured. We will use a unique power point presentation to show how difficult it is for obese patients to do simple things such as eating and using the toilet.

During this session, we will take a look at some of the most common injuries in obese patients and how difficult it is to render care. We will discuss how normal prehospital care equipment just doesn’t work. We discuss the use of bariatric

equipment including stretchers and ambulances. We will discuss the treatment for sprains, strains, fractures, and head injuries that are caused by their size and weight. We will also discuss how the obese patient often suffers from multiple medical conditions. We will discuss both BLS and ALS treatment for the morbidly obese patient.

**1015-1115 EMS and the Sexual Assault Victim - Karen Wilson-Diehl** **Salon A-D**

This presentation will address EMS as a key component of the Sexual Assault Response Team (SART). It will include education on victimology, evidence preservation, team communication, and an overview of the role of the forensic nurse examiner. This is an interactive presentation.

**1130-1230 “What’s that Smell?” Toxic Gases in the Pre-hospital Setting - Stephen Thornton, MD** **Salon A-D**

This will be a discussion regarding the toxicity and pre-hospital and definitive management of common toxic gases (chlorine, ammonia, hydrogen sulfide, etc.) that EMS personnel may encounter.

Staff Nurse-Emergency Dept., Saint Elizabeth Regional Medical Center

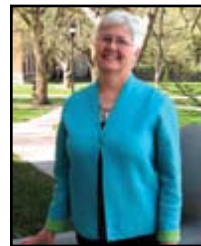
